The duct system has also been sanitized with Benefect. Rudy is also going to be installing infrared lights in the HVAC unit to further enhance our ability to keep the air fresh.

### Bios

#### Katie Ulm, Lead Kindergarten Teacher, Director of the Early Childhood Program

Katie Ulm found Waldorf education after eight years of nannying, forming and running childcare cohorts, and working multiple years teaching at a local Montessori school. Her first encounter with Waldorf education left a lasting impression that changed the course of her life forever. In 2016, Katie attended a lantern walk, a beloved Waldorf tradition and Acorn School staple, with her goddaughter who attended the school. From the moment she stepped foot in the classroom, and with the events that unfolded with this beautiful experience, a new soul stirring journey had begun. She was hired in 2017 as an assisting teacher to master teacher and founding Acorn School lead, Christi Nordoff, and enrolled in her training through Sunbridge Institute within the first weeks of joining the Acorn School community. Katie has been with the school ever since, and after graduating from her training program in 2020, took over as lead teacher and later took the position of Director of the Early Childhood Program. Katie will be welcoming her first child in the next few weeks and looks forward to joining parents on the profound path of parenthood.

#### Amanda Mosiman, Kindergarten Teacher, Handwork Teacher

The moment I walked into a Waldorf classroom fifteen years ago I knew my purpose was to work with children in a Waldorf setting. I went on to work in that kindergarten in San Diego, another in Boulder, and a parent child class in Fort Collins before having my own children, Calla Lynn and Oak. Then after the gift of staying home with them for seven years, I joined Acorn School last fall as a handwork teacher and kindergarten teacher. I'm so happy to be a part of this community, and to be outdoors with the children every day.
